## WORKS IN PROGRESS

- *Wiki-memory*. This project investigates the mnemonic structure of the Iraq War as it is articulated in the digital ecology. Through this research, I intend to draw larger conclusions about what is at stake when the memory of war is crowdsourced, algorithmically generated, and subject to the vagaries of cultural reflexivity.
- *Recording Absence*. The Department of Defense maintains a publicly available database that lists the names of every service member that was killed in America's post-9/11 wars. This multi-media project draws on conceptual photography and paper sculpture to visualize the absence of these individuals. And rather than reinstall their presence through photography, the project seeks to instead record their absence.
- *From Sentries to Silos*. This photography project reprises the quintessential American road trip as a visual critique of frontierism. But rather than travel east to west and thereby retrace American mythology the journey begins at the Laredo, Texas border crossing and continues north to Minot, North Dakota along U.S. Highway 83, where a part of America's nuclear arsenal is stored.

#### COURSES TAUGHT

- <u>Watching War in American Culture</u> (Spring 2022, 2023, 2024) three-credit hour visual culture seminar which examines the representation of war in visual modes of communication; selected the filmography, graded assignments, and developed a pedagogy that relied on group collaboration, frequent journaling, and the analysis of war films and other visual media.
- <u>Myth and History in American Memory</u> (Summer 2020) three-credit hour seminar which explored the formation of cultural memory by identifying how the 1950s is structured in the new media ecology; created two portfolio assignments and selected a range of primary source material to analyze, including a board game, collection of photographs and children's book.
- <u>Art is Everywhere</u> (Fall 2022) three credit-hour, interdisciplinary lecture that asked students to consider what art can be from both a historical and ethnographic perspective; co-taught three lectures and managed the coursework for 85 students, which included providing feedback on three written assignments and grading both a mid-term and comprehensive final exam.
- <u>Native America</u> (Fall 2021) three-credit hour lecture course which surveyed the history of indigenous peoples in North America; taught three weekly recitations (45 students); implemented a recitation structure that fostered collaboration, prepared students for course exams, and helped to improve their writing skills through routine critical response assignments.
- *Intersectionality* (Fall 2020) three-credit hour lecture designed to help students talk about race, gender, and sexuality; virtually taught two weekly recitation sections (30 students); introduced art and photography into the curriculum to explicate course themes, examples included work from Hank Willis Thomas, Rose Piper, and Kara Walker.
- <u>Reckoning with Race</u> (Fall 2019) organized and taught a three-week symposium that explored the mediation of race in university archives; developed a visual analysis assignment which required students to choose and analyze a photograph from the special collections archive; students presented their findings to a university audience.
- <u>Ackland Art Museum</u> (Fall 2018, Spring 2019, Fall 2019, Spring 2020, Fall 2022, Spring 2023) planned and delivered more than 200 hours of instruction to multiple audiences from various academic disciplines as a teaching fellow at the Ackland Art Museum; curated educational exhibits organized around topics such as war and photography.
